



INTERVIEW TRANSCRIPT: MARK CALCAVECCHIA

Saturday, August 27, 2011

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: There were some par 5s I could reach, you know, 8, par 5s and a few other short holes, so that's basically what happened. I managed to hit it on the green on 8, two-putt and made a six-footer on 12 and five-footer on 14 and finished birdie, eagle. So it just kind of happened that fast for me, so that was good.

Q. The shot -- what club on 17?

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: 17, I hit a 5-iron about 15 feet left of the hole and made that. Then 18, a good drive and a 3-iron, probably 17, 18 feet short left of the hole and it fell in on the last gasp so that was nice.

MODERATOR: Questions, guys?

Q. (Inaudible.)

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: I'm done thinking about it, to tell you the truth. I don't know. Every week I just show up and play as hard as I can. We'll see. I won't say I'm overdue. I probably -- you know, I just haven't played good enough for three straight days or four straight days. I've come close obviously and was looking like I was going to get the job done and then hit a bad drive or whatever. So I'll go out tomorrow and try to be careful, just kind of pick my spots and be patient. I don't think you have to go super low on this course because the greens, they're so firm. I'm not going to change anything tomorrow. I imagine the course will be -- the weather, everything's going to be the same, so looking forward to it.

Q. Is it frustrating not winning?

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: Not as a whole. In a couple tournaments I was pretty bummed out about it. You know, probably the one in Alabama at Shoal Creek, I guess I had a six-shot lead on Saturday at one point and I got around to the 12th hole on Sunday with a two-shot lead and made double on the same hole. I really played well all week. That was frustrating.

A couple certain events I had some chances, Des Moines, but Bob Gilder made the putts and played good, and a few others. All the times I've played out here I might have had a chance to win five of them seriously out of 28, whatever, I played. So I've got to get -- I've just got to get a big enough lead somewhere that I can afford to screw up. I've always been right around the edge.

Q. How difficult would your golfing life have been if you hadn't won a major?

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: I would say zero. It was 23 years ago, you know? I mean, it doesn't do a thing for me today. My golfing life was great. I mean, they didn't even have the PGA Grand Slam of Golf back then, it was a voluntary deal. Certainly it was obviously my greatest achievement in golf and I look at that Claret Jug in my house quite a bit, but it really didn't change anything with the exception of a couple years right after that, then I just kind of fell into my normal, you know, routine.

Q. I take it you're not surprised at the quality of play, the competitiveness of the plus 50s?

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: No, not at all. I've been saying that all along. Obviously I'd been playing attention the last three or four years before I got out here and saw the scores and knew some of the courses the guys were playing and watched a little bit. I either figured the hole was a little bit bigger, you know, it was a quarter of an inch bigger and they didn't tell anybody or something was up. I didn't know. It didn't take me long when I got out here to see. Obviously everybody my age that I know that I've been playing with, you know, on -- O'Meara and Sluman and guys on the TOUR and Sindelar, I obviously knew those guys were great, Kenny Perry, obviously all those guys are still great so I knew the guys were great out here.

Q. About three years out, your radar just all of a sudden extends and you're paying more attention?

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: I think so. The old 45 to 50, the limbo years, again, a guy like Kenny, he didn't have those; he had his best golf at that age. And I was certainly still competitive, I won when I was 47, but a lot of guys don't have a lot to do from the time they're 45 to 50. Some of them really don't have any status and they can get ...

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: I liked it, I thought it was beautiful. You know, a handful of greens they need to start over with so that's pretty much today's -- you know, the way golf courses are built today, either they're insanely long or the greens are obscenely slopey. Today was beautiful, I really liked it.

Q. Russ Cochran, is he one of those guys that --

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: Yeah, Russ didn't do a whole lot for a while in his middle to late 40s, but he's still in great shape. He looks like he did 10, 15 years ago. A lot

of that's the whole key to the deal. Russ turned 50 and all of a sudden he's out here playing, he's got some momentum going, and obviously he's playing as good as he ever has, I think. He's played great.

Q. You're so competitive. Is it more fun playing on this Tour?

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: Oh, it's a lot more fun for me. I've played I think six TOUR events this year and missed five of the cuts; two of them I missed by a shot where I sat there all day Friday afternoon pulling my hair out, I'm in, I'm out, I'm in, I'm out. You know, 30 years of that, you know, I can make my plane reservations on this Tour. I'll still try to play a few TOUR events every year. I know Kenny plays a lot more, but you know, that's what he wants to do. I'd rather be out here.

Q. At this point right now you're tied for the lead. Are you surprised that nobody's gone lower than 7-under at this point?

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: No, not at all. The greens are tough. They're so firm, it's hard to get wedges close. And they're not easy greens to read, either. At least I don't think so. They look like they're going to break and then they don't and it's tough to make a lot of putts out here. No, I was just trying to hang around.

Like I said, when I didn't do anything good on the front, I knew there were some birdie holes on the back and I thought if I could shoot 2- or 3-under and get it to 4-, 5-under, I would still have a shot tomorrow and I just went birdie, eagle, so I went from where I was hoping to get to 7-under in a hurry.

Q. Fred Couples is 2-under. Can he come back?

MARK CALCAVECCHIA: Yeah, 65 is a long way here, I don't know if it's possible with the way the greens are, but certainly Freddie can go out and shoot.63 or 4 or 5 any day he plays. If 7-under continues to lead, that's not too far back at all. A lot of guys have won from 5 shots back.
