Q. Marcus, I think you'll be the leading Australian heading into the final round of the Australian Open. How are you feeling about that?

MARCUS FRASER: Yeah, it's definitely a day that could have been a hell of a lot better, but not today and we'll try to do it all again tomorrow and add them all up.

Q. Do you walk away frustrated or do you walk away knowing that you put yourself right in the mix?

Then yeah, pretty average couple bogeys and just got the wind completely wrong down 17, hit it in the water. So it was definitely a round of when you do a lot of hard work in that breeze and stuff it up, it's frustrating.

Q. Abraham is playing well, he'll have a three or four shot lead. Can you run that down tomorrow?

MARCUS FRASER: Yeah, definitely, anyone can. When the course plays the way it's playing and we get another windy day, there's some high scores out there and there's some low scores. He's obviously playing well, but anything's possible.

Q. Of any track we play this on, is this where you're going to have a big swing (inaudible)?

MARCUS FRASER: Yeah, absolutely. I feel like the course suits me and it doesn't really suit any one of the top players. I think it probably cops a little bit of criticism, but I think it plays really well. It would be nice for them to mix up the pins a little bit more; there's a couple pins that feel like they're playing the same each day. They've got plenty of options out there, so hopefully they use them tomorrow.
