

MARK HUBBARD (-14)

Q. Mark, how would you assess your round today?

MARK HUBBARD: It was weird. I actually hit it way worse than I have the past two days and I missed a couple of pretty makeable putts early on, and even in my good stretch I missed like a four-, five-footer on No. 13, but I also made like a ton of bombs. So it was just kind of a weird, weird round, but I was proud with how I kind of hung in it, you know. I parred the first nine holes and it's really easy to get frustrated when you do something like that, especially when you see guys going low. I'm just happy the way I hung in there.

Q. How will you kind of attack tomorrow's round? You were in contention in Detroit. Some things you kind of learned from that experience and use it towards tomorrow?

MARK HUBBARD: Yeah, I mean, I think just stay patient like I did today; you never know when you're going to catch fire. Especially I'm a good mid-range putter, so I've just got to keep giving myself looks and eventually they're going to fall.

I made a little adjustment at the turn just kind of the way I was lining up my ball. Greens were pretty flat last week so it was kind of just point and shoot and out here there's a lot of slope. So I just stopped lining it up and just kind of freed myself up, so I'm going to continue to do that tomorrow and hopefully make a lot more putts.

Q. Can you just speak a little bit about the conditions and how -- it looked like everybody was shooting at a dartboard out there.

MARK HUBBARD: Yeah. I mean, I haven't played here in a couple years. Last time I was here, it's normally pretty firm and fast, but we obviously got a lot of rain the last couple days, so it's a little softer and definitely gettable. But the greens are still -- I mean, they're perfect. If you're hitting them, you can make any putt out there.

Q. What do you think you need to do to get your first win out here?

MARK HUBBARD: It's tough, man. I mean, winning's tough. All I can do is try and play as good as I can tomorrow and stay within myself. I think if you ask anybody, even the great ones out here, you've got to have a little bit of luck, you've got to have things go your way. So I can't really worry with that, I've just got to go out and shoot as low of a number as I can tomorrow.

Q. And do you have a number in mind for tomorrow?

MARK HUBBARD: Yeah, I mean, I usually like to chase a number. I don't like to get completely caught up in it and it might change as the day goes on with the conditions and stuff, but I'll probably have a number. I usually have a number at the beginning of the week what I think the winning score is going to be and kind of get a good assessment of what a good day-to-day score is.

At the beginning of the week with the softer conditions I kind of had 20 in my mind. Obviously I think -- did Rob stay at 17 or is he at 16? So it might be 21, 22, but I think 20's got a shot, 21, 22, something like that.
