



KEVIN KISNER (-19, lost 2nd playoff hole)

Q. What positives can you take from that?

KEVIN KISNER: Oh, for sure. I figured the number would be 19 or 20 to start the day and to be able to get there was a good round. I made one bogey in 74 holes, which is a hell of a golf I played four days. Hats off to Robert, he hit a heck of a shot on 18 and he played great as well to come back, birdie 17 and he's a deserving champion.

Q. Your first two times through 18 you had very good birdie looks. Are you going to look back at either one of those or something else?

KEVIN KISNER: The one I thought I made on the first playoff hole, I hit a good putt and just kind of snapped off the green there late. With him having nine feet, I wasn't going to be overly aggressive not to leave myself another three- to four-footer like I did in regulation. I played great and gave myself a ton of chances.

I just want to keep my playoff record intact here on Tour and not have a win in a playoff.

Q. Can you talk us through the second shot on the last playoff hole, just kind of the degree of difficulty in what you were trying to do?

KEVIN KISNER: Well, once I heard the crowd go, I was pretty much toast. It ran one inch through into the rough and I had a terrible lie, so I had to go at it and it was my only opportunity. I had no clue how the ball was going to come out of that lie so went for it. Decent 20-footer for par.

Q. Can you talk about your decision to go back to your irons that you won here originally with?

KEVIN KISNER: Yeah.

Q. Was that just this week that you made that decision?

KEVIN KISNER: Yeah.

Q. Why did you do that?

KEVIN KISNER: I was struggling with my distance control the last few weeks, couldn't figure out if it was the change in the weather or if it was me or if it was the irons. Knew they were familiar and had some good history with them here, so they seemed to work.

Q. Was there a target number coming into the day?

KEVIN KISNER: Yeah, I thought 19 or 20 would be a good spot to post. Obviously once I got rolling -- when he went back to 18 I thought 19 would be a really good number to post and it was.

Q. And then can you just walk us through that up-and-down on No. 7 you had there?

KEVIN KISNER: No. 7, oh, out of the sand, yeah, yeah. Pot luck, man. That's what happens when you win. Just trying to leave it short of the green and have a chance to par and it came out perfect and ran up there to four feet. That's just rub of the green type stuff.

Q. This might be an odd question, but you shoot 63. Is there a sense that you missed something coming in there that would have done it for you?

KEVIN KISNER: Not really, man. I didn't know I hit it close on 16, 17 or 18 in regulation. I had a good look in the playoff, hit a good putt, it just broke off more than I expected.
