Q. So the horn blows, you go and have this weather delay, come back out and you hole-out for eagle. How's that for a nice end to the round there?

CHRIS KIRK: Yeah, very nice. Shocking, for sure. We were kind of hurrying down 18 earlier, hearing some thunder rolling in the distance and hoping we could get done, and bummer we didn't, but it was certainly worth the wait.

Q. What did you do during the wait?

CHRIS KIRK: Watched the Braves game for a little while on my phone and that was not going so well, unfortunately. Had a PB&J and then another sandwich, Dr. Pepper. Just sat around.

Q. You played some great golf today, you birdied the most difficult hole on the golf course, No. 14. You had another eagle as well. What do you think was working well for you all day to allow that to happen?

CHRIS KIRK: Everything was pretty solid. I hit a couple of drives that I'd like to try again, but other than that, I hit a lot of really quality iron shots and felt like I rolled my putter reasonably well and had a couple nice par saves when I needed to. Just all in all, pretty good.

Q. You're currently 50 in the FedExCup standings, you're clear to next week. Do you still feel like it's a bit of a different event knowing what's on the line for so many people in terms of the energy of the tournament?

CHRIS KIRK: Yeah, for sure. And hopefully I can use that to my advantage, that I'm not playing with that same kind of pressure that some guys are. Really, I mean, Mark Brazil, the tournament director here at Wyndham, gave me my first start ever on the PGA TOUR when I was still an amateur, summer of 2007, so Mark's always been a great guy and so I try to always be here if I can at all.

Q. And just one last question, what are your impressions of the course, the takeaways?

CHRIS KIRK: It's in unbelievable shape. With how hot it was today and the fairways are relatively dry, the ball's definitely going forever. I mean, I've never seen the course play quite as short as it did today. I've played here a lot of times. The greens are firm enough where you've got to think about it, especially if you're landing it down grain, and they're lightning

fast like always. These are some of the most difficult greens to putt that we play all year with so much slope and the speed that they have.
