
Q. Tony, nice round today. Just take us through the highlights.

So to overcome that hurdle was huge and I think it's kind of proven that over this last little month.

Q. When you're on a heater like you were winning back to back, I know you had a lot of stuff to do back in Utah, but is part of you reluctant to take a week off thinking, jeez, maybe I might lose whatever I have going, and are you relieved to know obviously you haven't really missed a beat?

TONY FINAU: Yeah, I never played the Wyndham, I never played that golf course, so I was taking that off no matter what. I was ready to enjoy the couple wins at home and I was able to do that with my family.

My biggest thing last week was just to stay sharp, which I did. I played every day, I didn't really miss a day. I just wanted to play golf and make sure that I was going to be as sharp as I could going into the Playoffs because I know how big these three weeks are, so today just kind of proved I think that I was able to stay sharp.
