GREYSON SIGG (-14)



Q. Greyson, what was working so well for you out there today?

GREYSON SIGG: Well, I really didn't get going there until I think No. 12 on the back nine. Made some putts early that kind of kept me in the round. Didn't hit it great early on the front but stayed really patient out there. Was able to make kind of a longer putt on 12 and then from there on I kind of took off and just kept hitting really good golf shots and making some really nice putts there.

Q. How big are those putts? You kind of talked about it. How big are those putts early in the round to maybe keep a little momentum until you kind of get fully going?

GREYSON SIGG: Yeah, for sure. I made a really nice putt on the second hole and then I think it's No. 7 I made probably a 35-footer, a kind of big swinger. Instead of having five feet for par and walking off with a 2 on that hole was huge. Then just kind of kept it going, stayed patient like I said. It's pretty easy out there right now with these conditions, but we've got to keep making birdies.

Q. Greyson, how long have you lived in this area?

GREYSON SIGG: This is roughly eight and a half years.

Q. Somebody who's lived here actually hasn't won this thing yet.

GREYSON SIGG: For sure, the St. Simons curse.

Q. I'm wondering if it's a little undue pressure because in reality, no matter how many times you play these courses throughout the year, it doesn't look the same as when a PGA TOUR rules staff gets ahold of it, does it?

GREYSON SIGG: Yeah, sure. The pins are definitely in some harder places out there, greens are a little faster than what we normally see, but I think we've got some guys up there going into the weekend so hopefully we can get it done this week.

Q. Does it come down to being more familiar maybe with the wind?

GREYSON SIGG: I don't really know what it is. I don't think any of us can answer that. I think we all know this golf course very well, but think it's just golf, man. It's a weird sport.

Q. Do you have any kind of apprehension about the future of the Tour given the



changes that are coming, the reduced exemptions, the reduced field sizes, things like that? For a guy who's working as hard as you are to keep your status until you get to a certain level where you feel comfortable, is there any concern?

GREYSON SIGG: Yeah, I mean, it's hard. It's been a hard year for me this year, but to be honest with you, I just kind of let the Tour do what they do and my job is to go play the best golf possible and wherever I end up at the end of the year, that's where I end up. It's been a lot of change. It's been tough, like I said, but here we are.

Q. What's been so tough to you this year?

GREYSON SIGG: I would just say I haven't really gotten it going yet. I haven't putted great this year. There was kind of a lull in my approach play and driving, too. It was just one of those things where I took two or three months and had to -- I was in a hole and had to grind and figure it out. Had it going here for a little bit, so it's nice to see some results come through.

Q. Do you pay attention like this weekend to what you need to do to get inside the top-100?

GREYSON SIGG: Not at all, not at all.

Q. Just go play?

GREYSON SIGG: Yeah. I think you drive yourself insane if you start looking at where you're projected and all that. I just try and go out and do my best on every shot and see where I end up.

Q. So is there any difference then in how you would approach any other week or is it just the same, like --

GREYSON SIGG: Not really. I'm thinking I pretty much treat it the exact same as any other week. Like I said, I'm just going to go out and try to do the best I can on every shot and see what happens.
